



LEAD 2016 – a mid-point update

5 July 2016

LEAD 2016 is a third year of collaboration between UBS and CampVision to impact marginalized youths. It partners approximately 50 working professional volunteers and 50 youths together to

- develop maturity in self **leadership**, and be empowered to be an effective leader of their peers and positive influence on others; and
- cultivate effective and dynamic **communication** skills.

Through a series of structured sessions, the youths and volunteers have learnt to own their personal feelings and how to manage their individual confidence physiology. They learnt also various forms of communication – verbal and non-verbal – and how to make small talk with other adult volunteers. Both youths and volunteers have all set personal tangible goals, relating to leadership and/or communication, that they will need to achieve by graduation in October. At every LEAD session, they meet in their small groups to hold one another accountable for actions taken (or not taken) in this journey.

LEAD 2016 is facilitated by Andrew Bryant, author, international speaker and executive leadership coach. Andrew uses facilitation, coaching and gamification to create an engaging and transformational learning experience.

LEAD 2016 is now at mid-point of the 10-session journey. We have observed that youths have increasingly gained confidence in themselves. They take on opportunities to lead energizer games, do public speaking in front of the LEAD 2016 cohort, and practice small talk with adult strangers. During LEAD 2016, the youths interact and engage with different LEAD 2016 volunteers who represent a broad variety of professions, including banking, sales, legal, marketing, technology, HR and the military. The volunteers are of different nationalities and collectively, have worked and lived in more than 20 countries.

LEAD is also about family and team. It is an affirming, safe and empowering community of youths and working professionals who find the courage to be vulnerable in their endeavor to be better individuals. They choose to share their respective challenges around leadership and communication with each other, and everyone is each other's support. The connections that are built through the LEAD journey broaden the youths' exposure and their world view. These connections also contribute towards the building of social capital between two groups of people who may otherwise not have had their paths crossed and be personally impacted by each other.

We are proud of the various milestones that the youths, and their volunteers, have achieved to-date, and are excited for where their respective potential will lead them.

Thank you for the support in LEAD 2016 and, especially, for your trust. We appreciate your continued support because without it, we would not be able to move the needle for these youths.
